

Care Program Update

This year was a challenging, transformational, and enriching year for the sanctuary as well for team doubled in size, species expert teams were created to provide the residents with even more individualized care, resident living spaces were enhanced; the duck ponds, paddock paradise for the horses, and our donkey shelter were designed and constructed. With a full team of caregivers, we are able to fully provide our residents with the individualized and specialized care that they truly deserve. The residents are now getting the best medical, have ever received. Our daily medical care and treatments for our residents have increased as with our animal friends.

of the progress the care team has made with our equine residents. Our horse and donkey residents need daily hoof treatments to provide them with the best hoof health possible and when we first started to do these daily treatments it was very challenging, especially with the donkeys. Today, we're able to work with all of our equine residents. This wouldn't have been possible without the dedication and hard work of the whole care team. The love, care, patience and compassion that the team provided to our equine residents as they learned to trust and work with us was such a beautiful thing to witness.

Another big success this year in animal care was learning how to work safely and compassionately with our cow residents on trimming their hooves. We are currently doing cooperative care with the cows and are getting them comfortable with physical touch on their legs and hooves and ultimately working up to trimming their hooves. Each individual cow resident is at their own stage in this process and is making progress in their own way. It's really exciting and heartwarming to know that we are and will continue to be able to care for our cow residents and provide them with compassionate hoof care. Standard cow hoof trimming operations are dangerous, inhumane, and are horrific to witness. Tilt machines are used to trim cows hooves, a machine that encloses them, lifts them up in the air, and tilts them on their sides to perform the hoof trim. This is extremely invasive and traumatizing to our animal friends, and devastating to human witnesses. I am grateful for the opportunity to work with our cow residents in a more cooperative way, so that they never have to experience the horrors of that machine.

enrichment for the residents and cooperative care We have been practicing cooperative care with a handful of the residents for their hoof treatments and hoof trimmings and are looking forward to expanding that level of care to all of our residents in 2022. With cooperative care, our residents will be able to opt in and out and choose to participate in their care. 

Our donkey trio of Leo, Frida, and Dali have come a long way since their arrival to Luvin Arms in November 2020. When we first saw them they were terrified. They had very little human interaction before the Luvin Arms team met them. They were given bread as treats but rarely did anyone ever touch them. Many health issues resulted from a poor diet. Their hooves were extremely overgrown, in fact they had never been trimmed in their entire life. This caused them severe pain and body imbalance. their trust. As their hoof condition improved, so did their relationship with people. Slowly but surely they associated people with positive experiences. This positivity was accelerated with the introduction of the clicker play program. The clicker play program has given the donkeys agency, comfort, interaction, positivity, and an opportunity to explore and build relationships. Volunteers and staff now implemented an Individualized Enrichment Program for Leo, Frida, and Dali, tending to their specific needs

It took months to address their many medical needs. The care team began the process by working with them to gain their trust. Because these donkeys would need daily hoof care, it was essential that they first became comfortable with the care team who would be treating them. At first, this process was difficult. All three donkeys needed sedation to complete their hoof treatments. This took months to accomplish. We were not able to get close enough to sedate them, let alone halter them. So even figuring out a way to trim their hooves for the first time did not happen right away. We were finally able to sneak sedatives into their treats and then trim their hooves while they were asleep. Their association with a halter was negative, which brought about a daily challenge to provide them with care. Even at the sight of a human entering their residence, they would run in the opposite direction.

Every member of the care team spent hours herd of happy, healthy, and thriving donkeys at interacting with Leo, Frida, and Dali, introducing Luvin Arms.

them to positive interactions, and slowly gaining

but surely they associated people with positive experiences. This positivity was accelerated with the introduction of the clicker play program. opportunity to explore and build relationships. Volunteers and staff now implemented an Individualized Enrichment Program for Leo, Frida, and Dali, tending to their specific needs and personalities. They willingly performed tasks such as target touching, name recognition, and walking calmly next to their partner. We then implemented cooperative care into their programs. We focused on answering the question of "What skills do they need to positively associate with their daily care?" Volunteers and caregivers began implementing training behaviors such as desensitization to touch, positive associations to the halter, and the ability to raise their hooves for cleaning. After months of careful and intentional training, our donkeys have the choice to perform these tasks, which they often do! Leo, Frida, and Dali truly enjoy their training sessions because they are so fun and engaging.

As of today, all three donkeys freely choose to engage in the halter process. They choose to participate in their hoof treatment. They are happy when people enter their residence and expect some nice pats and scratches. They are a herd of happy, healthy, and thriving donkeys at Luvin Arms.


PADDOCK PARADISE

Due to Niblet's, Belle's, Frida's and Leo's laminitis, they cannot graze on grass pasture. Our solution was to create our Paddock Paradise. Based on Jamie Jackson's legendary research on wild horses, Paddock Paradise is a revolutionary model for safe, natural living and play areas, hoof care, and the healing and rehabilitation of lame horses and donkeys. The premise of Paddock Paradise is to stimulate equines to behave and move naturally according to their instincts. This is the key to having physically and mentally healthier horses. This unique and unprecedented model is adaptable to virtually all size properties and fits all equine breeds.

We finished construction on a new perimeter fencing for a 90,300 square foot space for our horses and donkeys to give them a safe space to roam, frolic, and play. Four of our equines have laminitis, a severe, painful, and often recurring condition. Laminitis affects the tissues bonding the hoof wall to the pedal bone in the hoof and can result in the pedal bone sinking or rotating within the hoof under the weight of the horse. At a certain threshold in the disease, equines must be euthanized as the condition is not reversible. Hoof support, dietary changes, and pain relievers are the only treatments available, all of which we have provided to our residents with laminitis. The 4 residents at Luvin Arms with laminitis are on a strict diet of Timothy Hay to preserve their health and wellbeing







DUCK PONDS

We are excited to announce we completed construction on 3 ponds for our duck residents at Luvin Arms. All of the ducks are quackingly happy! Did you know that ducks require access to water? The absolute longest a duck should go without water is 8 hours, but even that short amount of time can have negative effects on their health. Until we built the ponds, we had been filling kiddie pools daily for the ducks to dip and swim in, but the pools are not filtered, they are not large enough, and dumping them created environmental issues.

MISTING SYSTEMS

This year Luvin Arms installed 3 Misting systems in each of the barns. Misting Systems have proved to be invaluable to the sanctuary. They create a cool, comfortable environment to keep the animals safe from heat stress. Incredibly, misting systems can reduce the temperature in the living areas by as much as 15 degrees fahrenheit. Misting systems also clean the air of dust, reduce disease risk and flying insect discomfort and irritation. The Misting systems represent a major improvement for the overall comfortability of all of our human and animal friends.

GENERATORS

The numerous weather and natural disaster threats to our power infrastructure made us consider the worst-case scenarios in the event of a power outage. Our bird barns are each equipped with industrial heaters as chickens in particular are susceptible to cold temperatures (frostbite and death are common in sub-freezing conditions).


We recognized that this was an unacceptable risk to our residents, and we now have two generators for the bird barns to ensure that they will always remain safe in freezing conditions.

PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT & ADVOCACY:

Volunteer involvement has been the core of Luvin Arms since its inception in 2015. Founders Shilpi and Shaleen Shah envisioned a community of compassionate and dedicated volunteers bonded in the mission of Luvin Arms. At that time, we were all volunteers learning and working together to give our small cadre of rescued animals the best care possible.

As Luvin Arms has grown, so has our volunteer program. Our volunteer program includes dedicated volunteers who have been with us since our founding, as well as new volunteers who are accepted on a rolling basis, allowing us to consistently grow our program and support of our residents and staff. New volunteer opportunities are added to include volunteers with varying interests and abilities. Volunteer opportunities include Chef for the Residents (chopping vegetables and fruit), Animal Care (cleaning and maintaining pastures and interior living areas),

and helping our Facilities Team with grounds and building maintenance. Our goal is to involve as many interested members of the local community as possible.

As of December 31, 2021, there were 667 accepted volunteers. Of the 667, 428 joined Luvin Arms as volunteers during the 2021 calendar year. We are a growing sanctuary!

Numbers alone do not come close to representing the depth of dedication and involvement of our many volunteers. Luvin Arms is fortunate to attract multitalented and extraordinarily enthusiastic volunteers. Groups of volunteers and individual volunteers routinely go above and beyond in their contributions to Luvin Arms. Here are just two examples.

-- Many volunteers elect to spend time with

residents at least weekly to provide activities and forms of enrichment specific to the needs and interests of their particular resident partner. This Enrichment Program is unique to Luvin Arms, and not only provides joy and enrichment to our residents, but also allows a volunteer to develop a personal relationship with their special resident.

-- Another aspect of the Enrichment Program is environmental variety. In September a group of volunteers came together to build custom perches for our chickens. This was a complex project including perches, swings and grass boxes. The call went out to our volunteers for a miter saw and our volunteers came through, not only providing a saw and the complete setup needed to operate it, but they came with their expertise to do all the detailed cutting and assure the perfect assembly needed for each structure. At the end of just a few hours, we had six wonderful perch playgrounds for our chicken residents.



HIGHLIGHTS

We had an exciting ending to 2021. We had numerous events that introduced and engaged many new people to Luvin Arms and our mission!

Tito's Trick or Treat Street was our biggest onsite event since COVID. People loved getting back out to the sanctuary and we hosted over 200 people! We set up stations around the sanctuary and handed out candy along with facts about our residents. After walking the sanctuary, guests played BINGO! Instead of numbers, we created a Luvin Arms resident bingo. People loved learning more about our residents and were very engaged. The prize was a framed picture of our residents, which was a major hit! Our halloween event will definitely become an annual event, and we can't wait to celebrate next year!

We introduced adult craft nights, and had a great response. The first class took place in October, at which we created fall wreaths. The class was limited to 23 people and we almost sold out! 21 people attended, and over half the people were new to Luvin Arms. We had a cuddle session with the residents before crafting, and it was a great opportunity to share our story. Our second craft night also had a great response. We are excited to make these a monthly event at Luvin Arms!

2021 IMPACT:

ENRICHMENT & COOPERATIVE CARE PROGRAM

The Luvin Arms Enrichment Program seeks to enrich the lives of residents, improve cooperative care procedures, create community and engagement within the volunteer group, and educate the public on the individuality of each resident. The program has two main focuses: individual enrichment and environmental enrichment.

The Individual Enrichment Program is primarily focused around Clicker Play, an enrichment tool which creates a common language between humans and animals through rewarding cooperative behaviors with positive reinforcement—and environmental enrichment.

This program pairs caregivers and volunteers, known as Enrichment Partners, with residents for a minimum of 6 months. Enrichment Partners meet with their resident at least once a week, teaching them skills and engaging them in games that are stimulating, fun, and practical for daily care such as voluntary hoof trims, weighing and other necessary procedures. The 'click' in Clicker Play is such an impactful tool for learning as it helps the residents identify exactly what behavior we are reinforcing. This program has allowed the residents to have more control over their care routines while also feeling safer and more comfortable with humans. So comfortable in fact, that our cows voluntarily engage in hoof trimmings, lifting up each hoof for our team to examine and trim. It is for procedures like these that the clicker play program really shines. The program has improved our philosophy of cooperative care in other ways as well. Because caregivers and volunteers are working together on a consistent basis, we are able to notice small changes in the residents behavior from week to week. It's these observations that allow us to notice any possible concerns that might otherwise not have been addressed.

Lastly, the bond between a resident and their Enrichment Partner through the clicker play program is truly significant to each and enriching. Partners build a strong, trusting relationship that is unlike any other. The Enrichment Programs at Luvin Arms are revolutionizing the way we interact with animals across the world.

Under the Environmental Enrichment Program, we focus on the housing environments for each resident. This includes everything from permanent structures and fixtures to temporary or seasonal additions, and can be something as simple as a weekly special treat dispenser. The aim of environmental enrichment is to provide variety and cognitive growth for residents in a space where they feel truly at home.



For the year of 2022, Luvin Arms has planned 8 medium-length films, with topics that extensively cover the stories of our residents, the resources required to provide meaningful lives to rescued farmed animals, and the environmental, human health, and ethical consequences of the animal agriculture industry.

Through cinematic, expertly crafted content, Luvin Arms is changing the hearts and minds of people around the world to expand their circle of compassion to include all beings.

This year, Luvin Arms looks forward to partnering with an innovative architect to help craft a sitemap for our master plan of this unique sanctuary. We envision a beautiful village of harmony that sings sanctuary to every soul and inspires people to connect with these incredible beings and embrace more compassionate and sustainable choices for the future of all beings.

PADDOCK PARADISE

Paddock Paradise is a concept based on the "lifestyles of the wild and free-roaming horses living naturally in the U.S. Great Basin." The goal of Paddock Paradise is to facilitate the physical and mental health of equines, especially for those that are unable to graze – like some of our residents. A genuine Paddock Paradise can virtually eliminate the risk of laminitis, as well as other debilitating conditions.

We have installed new fencing around the 90,300 square feet perimeter, installed new fencing within the perimeter, cleared the area of weeds, put down weed barriers, and provided many different subsurfaces that go throughout the maze of fences. We also completed construction on the new barn for the donkeys.

Here are some of the benefits:

- · Encourages constant movement, as nature intended
- · Constant movement allows natural hoof wear
- · Protects horses from dangerous founder-prone pastures
- · Provides natural outlets and mental stimulation
- · Provides an effective means for diet and weight management

The continuation of the development of our Paddock Paradise by adding an interior arena where our equine family can play and engage in enrichment activities with staff and volunteers is greatly needed for this year. The arena will add to their existing area and give Niblet, Jale, Belle, Leo, Dali, and Frida the exercise and mental stimulation they need to stay healthy. We greatly appreciate your support!
